Trash to treasure

Students will learn about upcycling common items found around their home.

 Recycling or clean waste; glue and/or string and/or tape (usually)

 All grades

 30+ minutes

Introduction

Instead of downcycling, why not upcycle? The sky's the limit in terms of how you can create treasure from trash. From used ski furniture to old CD suncatchers, cardboard sculptures to tin can bird feeders, there are so many ways to create art and/or useful objects from what other people might mistakenly call waste.

Activity

Your challenge, should you choose to accept it, is to come up with a treasure... to create something useful and/or beautiful out of something that would usually be thrown away (either in the recycling or waste stream).
